From the Pastor's Desk

Dependent Independence

Greetings in the name of our Faithful and Powerful God.



Personal freedom is a hot topic these days. Everyone has their idea of right and wrong, and what they should have and be able to do. It would seem as if we are 325 million individual states/countries, rather than a United States. As Christians, we are free but not free, we are masters of our lives, yet servants of our brothers and sisters around us.

Paul writes: 1 Corinthians 10:23-33, ²³ All things are lawful for me, but not all things are helpful; all things are lawful for me, but not all things edify. ²⁴ **Let no one seek his own, but each one the other's well-being.** ²⁵ Eat whatever is sold in the meat market, asking no questions for conscience' sake; ²⁶ for "the earth is the LORD's, and all its fullness." ²⁷ If any of those who do not believe invites you to dinner, and you desire to go, eat whatever is set before you, asking no question for conscience' sake. ²⁸ But if anyone says to you, "This was offered to idols," do not eat it for the sake of the one who told you, and for conscience' sake; for "the earth is the LORD's, and all its fullness." ²⁹ "Conscience," I say, not your own, but that of the other. For why is my liberty judged by another man's conscience? ³⁰ But if I partake with thanks, why am I evil spoken of for the food over which I give thanks? ³¹ **Therefore, whether you eat or drink, or whatever you do, do all to the glory of God.** ³² Give no offense, either to the Jews or to the Greeks or to the church of God, ³³ **just as I also please all men in all things, not seeking my own profit, but the profit of many, that they may be saved.** (emphases added)

While Paul understands his personal freedom, he also understands his Christian calling. He is to live his life for others, not for himself. In all things he considers the needs of others, not just himself. It is a hard concept to sell these days, yet it is a vital need, and should be a vital concern for each of us.

In "On the Freedom of the Christian," November of 1520, Luther puts forth a great paradox, A Christian is an utterly free man, lord of all, subject to none. A Christian is an utterly dutiful man, servant of all, subject to all.

Jesus also puts forth the same concern in Matthew 18:6, ⁶ But if anyone causes one of these little ones who believe in Me to stumble, it would be better for him to have a large millstone hung around his neck and to be drowned in the depths of the sea.

While we celebrate our independence, let us also carry the needs of our neighbors with us to the cross. While we are on our knees, let us consider the world around us, and plead with the Lord Almighty for His divine protection and intervention. Let us also pray that He would put upon our hearts the dependent relationships we are placed into, so that we might not become an island unto ourselves.

This Independence Day, we pray for healing in our nation and our world, as we join with one another in service to God and our fellow man. We are truly free to live our own lives, but we are also called to live in service to one another. As each of us take up that task that the Lord has placed upon us, may healing begin, and people be strengthened.

PILLOWCASE DRESSES

SUGGESTIONS:

- New or gently used pillowcases make darling dresses for lots of girls around the world!
- Seamstresses are very creative and have added ruffles and pockets. If pockets are placed on the dress, make sure nothing is placed in the pocket (i.e., money, prayers, blessings, etc.).

INSTRUCTIONS

Using a new or gently used pillowcase, cut along the top of the pillowcase (where it is sewn together, opposite of the open end). This will become the top of the dress.

Lay the pillowcase flat and measure and cut J-shaped armholes at the top corners (3" to 4" x 3" to 4" depending upon the size of the pillowcase.

Make casing by turning the top of the cut edge under $\frac{1}{4}$ " and then another $\frac{1}{4}$ ". Iron in place – it needs to be wide enough that $\frac{1}{4}$ " to $\frac{1}{2}$ " wide elastic pieces will slide through easily. Sew close to the edge. Repeat this step for the back of the dress. You should now have a casing on both sides at the top of each side of the pillowcase.







Cut 2 pieces of ¼" or ½" elastic, each 7" long. Attach a safety pin to one end of one of the cut pieces of elastic and pull it through the casing using caution not to pull it too far. Sew across each end of the casing to hold the elastic in place. Repeat this step for the other side. You should now have a gathered top on both the front and back of the dress. (Make sure you remove the safety pin!)

Using double-fold bias tape, cut 2 pieces approximately 32" – 34" long. These will bind the armholes and become the ties at the shoulders, so they should be long enough to tie a bow at the top.


Fold one tie in half to find the center and line it up with the center of the armhole – then work outward from there to both sides. Pin the open ends of the bias tape over the raw edges of the armhole – the ties will extend evenly over each top.

Special note on the ties: packaged bias tape is folded not quite in half lengthwise. When ready to sew it on, make sure the narrow half of the tape faces up. That way you will always catch the underside of the tape, even around the curves.

Fold the raw edges of the ends of the bias tape inside and when sewing along the tape, it will catch those also.

Tie your ties and your dress is finished!




